Canyon View Trail

Hidden Falls Regional Park, Placer County, California by Robert H. Sydnor, Engineering Geologist and AERC Trail Master April 2016

Introduction and Location

The Canyon View Trail is a splendid trail that is parallel to Coon Creek canyon and its cascading waterfalls. This newly-constructed 2014 trail is a wonderful addition to the two-dozen interlinking trails within Hidden Falls. This short 0.3—mile trail interconnects with dozens of other trails (as shown on the accompanying trail-map).

Hidden Falls Regional Park is located in southwestern Placer County, about seven miles northwest of Auburn.

From the parking lot, ride your horse along constructed trails and the gravel road of the North Legacy Trail, then across the Whiskey Diggins Bridge and ascend Turkey Ridge. Following the trail map shown below, descend to Coon Creek which is the principal drainage within Hidden Falls Regional Park. Canyon View Trail connects with many other equestrian trails. It provides good views down into the narrow canyon of Coon Creek, with cataracts and waterfalls in the spring season during maximum hydrologic flow.

Index Map to Canyon View Trail



The **Canyon View Trail** frequently ascends and descends, so the trail gradient is *not* optimum for equestrians at a fast-trot or a canter. This short trail segment is best at a **walking pace** for your horse. Equestrians should focus on the Springtime **sound** of the rapids and cataracts along Coon Creek near the bridge.

Creating a Compost

Did you know that one horse produces about 50 pounds of manure per day and more than eight tons per year? Add to that the 8 to 10 gallons of urine a horse generates daily, and a wheelbarrow or more of used bedding, and in no time at all you have a virtual manure mountain on your farm. That mountain can take up a whole lot of space that most horse owners would probably enjoy using for far more appealing things than manure storage (A paddock or training area, perhaps!). Plus, you risk mismanaging with a manure pile: Horses grazing near their own manure can be reinfected by larvae that hatch from worm eggs within. Odors and flies can plague you or your neighbors, and unsightly poop piles can potentially decrease property value. Plus, runoff from soggy manure can cause serious water quality issues for creeks, wetlands, and drinking water.

Composting is a great manure management technique to avoid these problems, particularly for small acreage horse owners. "Composted horse manure is a great source of slow-release soil nutrients for a pasture or garden," says Caitlin Price Youngquist, PhD, a soil scientist and an area Extension educator for the University of Wyoming, in Worland. All organic matter, including manure and bedding, decomposes eventually. "Composting is basically a controlled microbial decomposition of organic material, done under aerobic (with air) conditions. This process is happening all around us in nature," Youngquist says. "As composters, we are trying to set this process up to produce a more uniform product more quickly than nature would provide. In order to do this, bacteria and fungi require oxygen, water, and nutrients. Our job as a compost manager is to provide the best environment possible for them to do their job."

As a bonus, as manure and other stall waste break down, the microorganisms generate tremendous amounts of heat that destroy weed seeds, fly larvae, worm eggs, and other disease-causing pathogens.

Ready to consider harnessing these microbes for good on your own property? To begin, Youngquist suggests first figuring out about how much manure you are managing. How many horses do you have? Are you picking up manure daily from stalled horses, or are your horses mostly pastured?

"Once you know how much manure you are dealing with, your two best environmentally sound management practices are to either haul manure off-site or compost it," states Youngquist. While compost management does require a time

commitment, it provides you with a free source of a valuable soil amendment for your pastures, garden, or yard. Compost also saves you money—over the course of a year the manure one horse produces is worth \$300 to \$500 in compost value. If composting sounds like the right option for you, then "you want some type of aerated system, either static or turned," says Youngquist. Both options add air to the compost, keeping it aerobic: A static system forces air into the pile using a blower, whereas a turned pile involves adding air by turning it occasionally, usually with a tractor.

Composting is a good manure management option, especially for horse owners on small acreage, because it helps reduce parasites, contaminated runoff, and other problems that can be caused by a heaping pile of manure.

Skillman Horse Camp

Skillman Horse Camp no longer available for individual camp sites and/or shortened camping season, or??

Skillman Horse Camp, north of Grass Valley on Highway 20, has great trails, horse corrals, bathrooms, picnic tables, running water all of which is a rare treat for equestrians in Tahoe National Forest. Gold Country Trails Council (GCTC) has spent many volunteer hours keeping the fee based camp, on our public lands in shape. Surprisingly, the Forest Service has now decided it cost too much to operate and it may not be available for individual camping any longer. The Tahoe National Forest contends that the camp must be more fully utilized in order to continue its present use. So let's use it more!!

GCTC is working with the Tahoe National Forest to determine the future of Skillman Horse Camp, 2016 will be a trial year of that decision with continuation of the camp available to individual as well as group campers by reservations and "walk ins". One of the options for future use will be by reservation only for groups (no individual camp sites). The lack of single use camp sites at Skillman would be a travesty for so many individual equestrian campers.

It is imperative that Skillman Horse Camp have increased use this summer!! Tell your out of area friends about this beautiful camp and camp at Skillman yourself. It has lots to offer: 16 camp sites, several with corrals, all with picnic tables and fire rings; also vault rest rooms, and horse water, in a lovely setting with miles of signed riding trails. Up to date maps to be available soon n the GCTC website!

What else can you do? Volunteer at the Skillman workdays in May. Write letters to The Tahoe National Forest supporting continued use of Skillman as a horse camp. (USFS, 631 Coyote Street, Nevada City, CA 95959) Help GCTC with ideas to share with TNF on ways to reduce the costs of running Skillman. Also go to the Skillman Facebook page and 'like' them, the more attention the camp gets the more the Forest Service will realize the camp is important to so many equestrians and their friends. Remember: USE IT OR LOSE IT.
