Hidden Falls Updates and Information

Set forth below is a copy of the letter submitted to the Placer County Board of Supervisors on behalf of Placer Trails, a coalition of which we are a member. This is our last push for approval of the Hidden Falls Expansion. The most important points have been set forth in this letter. If possible, please take a few minutes to write a letter of your own to submit to the BOS prior to the hearing date of March 8. This is the critical time when your voice needs to be heard. You can make it simple by just stating that you support the Reduced Project at Hidden Falls, or you can take some points from this letter to use in a letter of your own, setting forth your support and the reasons why. If possible, now is also the time for you to make a public statement in support of the project which you can do in several ways: You can appear in person; via Zoom; or you can call in. I will be sending out detailed instructions for the different options as soon as they are received from Placer County.

Placer Trails, a coalition of seven trail groups active in Placer County with over 4,000 members, enthusiastically supports the Hidden Falls Trail Expansion Project. Our primary comments on the Project are summarized briefly below and addressed in more detail for selected issues in Attachment 1.

Trails are a favorite of Placer County residents, whether you hike, ride a bike or horse, or run. The County opinion survey for the Parks and Trail Masterplan showed multi-use trails as the top priority for future park projects—91 percent support more trails and recreation access to open space. Placer County's foothill trails are in high demand, but short supply, and users of these trails routinely experience overcrowding of popular trailheads and trails, especially at Hidden Falls Regional Park.

The Expansion Project will double the size of the Hidden Falls trail network and provide public access to more than 2,500 acres of open-space preserves owned by Placer Land Trust. For more than 15 years, the Land Trust has been working together with Placer County, the State of California, foundations, and willing landowners to acquire this natural open space and working rangeland north of the existing Hidden Falls Regional Park, extending to the Bear River.

Over \$7 million of County funds have been invested along with State and foundation funds to permanently protect these lands as natural open space, for continued livestock grazing, and to provide for public trail access. Each acquisition that the County helped fund included deeded trail easements owned by the County to provide public trail access. Without trail access the County would not have participated and there would be no preserves. Taxpayers now deserve access to the trails we have invested in.

The Supplemental Environmental Impact Report (SEIR) for full build-out of the Trail Expansion Project, which would include three new trailheads, more than 350 new parking spaces, and 30 miles of trail, concluded that all but a few potential impacts would be less than significant. Fire officials approved plans for wildfire mitigation and evacuation and traffic engineers approved the adequacy of area roads. Cal Fire data do not show use of non-motorized trails as a significant fire risk.

In addition to fire and traffic, opponents fear that trail recreation and livestock grazing will not be compatible and that agriculture will suffer. However, there are examples throughout California, including East Bay Regional Parks, City of San Luis Obispo and several more, where there have been years of uneventful coexistence of multi-use trails through open rangeland with no ill-effects on livestock or trail users. Recreation and agriculture can successfully coexist and both are critical to our region's economy.

In response to public comment, economics, and other factors not evaluated in the SEIR, County Parks has proposed a Reduced Project as a compromise between (1) the Full Project evaluated in the SEIR, and (2) elimination of the project as sought by neighborhood opponents. The Reduced Project is similar to the lowest-impact Project alternative evaluated in the SEIR, but with even less public access. The Reduced Project would reduce public access, but would have the least negative impact on the environment and the neighborhood because it reduces parking and traffic by more than 60 percent. In fact, County staff estimate that the amount of traffic added by the Reduced Project would be no more than the traffic added if the Expansion Project preserves had instead been developed to the level allowed by current zoning.

Placer Trails has carefully considered the Reduced Project in relation to our previous recommendation to proceed with the Full Project. Despite reduction of new parking by more than half from the Full Project, as well as elimination of public access at Curtola Ranch Road, the Reduced Project stills achieves a modest increase in parking and, most importantly, will grant public access to 30 miles of new trails through Land Trust preserves—trails in which taxpayers have invested millions.

Placer Trails supports the Reduced Project as an acceptable compromise that will substantially reduce neighborhood impacts, already deemed less than significant, while still opening up new multi-use trails for public use. The Parks Commission and the Planning Commission have agreed. We hope that the opponents of the project will also see this as a reasonable compromise.

Seldom has it been so clear as during the global pandemic that the health of our community depends on ready access to nature and trails. The new year-round trails at Hidden Falls will be less than 30 min from most people in the County. The Board of Supervisors should move ahead to certify the SEIR and approve the Reduced Project. This will allow the County to accept the State grant of over \$3 million to fund most of the Twilight Ride trailhead. Stopping the Trail Expansion Project will deny taxpayers the benefits of the millions invested to date and damage Placer County's credibility with State grant programs. Let's get going to create a truly unique and expansive trail system in the foothills of Placer County for present and future generations.

Re: Hidden Falls Regional Park Trail Expansion Project: LBHA Supports Certification of the Final SEIR and Implementation of the Reduced Project

Loomis Basin Horsemen's Association (LBHA) supports the Reduced Project implementation that County Parks proposes. As is evidenced by the trailhead situation at Mears Place, there currently is a much greater demand for trails than we can accommodate.

LBHA is a member of Placer Trails and, as such, incorporates herein by reference, as though fully set forth, the letter (including exhibits) submitted by Placer Trails dated February 24, 2021 to the Board of Supervisors. For your convenience, a copy of that letter (without exhibits) is attached hereto.

Since 2007 Placer County has participated in the expansion area acquisitions. The total acreage of these acquisitions is 2,593 acres for a total acquisition cost of \$15,380,000. Of this amount Placer County has contributed \$7,512,100. All these acquisitions have gone through the normal hearing process and all were approved by the various commissions, including this Commission. During this hearing process, it has always been represented that these acquired lands would be open to the public. THERE CAN BE NO PUBLIC USE WITHOUT PUBLIC ACCESS.

Now, an opportunity has arisen which allows for another access point. The current reservation system is proof that more access is needed. The residents in the proximity of this new access point (Rural Placer) are opposed to further development of the park. County Parks has listened to Rural Placer and made a sincere effort to address their concerns. The result is a Reduced Project (by approximately 60%), which is what is being presented for your consideration and final approval.

Rural Placer has disappointed in that it has not participated in any negotiations or compromise from its original position.

Rural Placer's position that the park should remain "status quo" is unacceptable. Leading docent led hikes up to a dozen times a year to a limited group of individuals is not making this land available for public use. The land was acquired with public funds, for public use. The public has a right to enjoy the land which, ultimately, was the original goal.

The fact that a well-organized small group of residents can come together and derail a project which has been in the planning stages for over 15 years is upsetting. It was never a secret that there was a plan for Hidden Falls and its expansion. That plan has been made public since 2007. It is also upsetting that Placer County would spend millions of dollars towards a project and then not approve the final phase.

This Commission, together with all the other commissions, over the past 15 years, has been instrumental in acquiring the land in this project to be preserved for future generations. It is time to live up to and fulfil the representations made to the public and paid for with taxpayer dollars.

Placer County continues to grow. There is a huge demand for outdoor activity and trails like the ones proposed in the Reduced Project.

LBHA urges your votes to approve the Reduced Project.



It's important to close and lock the red parking lot gates when you leave.


We have had "renegades" come in during the night and early morning and use our arena for 4 wheeling and dirt donuts causing us to resurface and sand the arena.


